

# Cursive Writing Implementation Guide

## Grades 2–5

### Overview

This program includes a Cursive Writing program that contains fourteen lessons of instruction. The program covers the lowercase and uppercase alphabets and, with the accompanying cursive Activity Book (blackline master included), it provides students with many opportunities to work toward and achieve legible and fluid cursive penmanship.

All grade levels include a blackline master of the Student Activity Book where the activity pages can be printed out or copied. Activity pages provide practice opportunities that can be done in class or at home.

### Implementation: Grades 2–5

To implement the Cursive Writing program, schedule 15–20 minutes of extra time each day in addition to the core instructional lesson time.

The writing lessons begin during Unit 1 of each grade. It is highly recommended that the cursive lessons begin no earlier than the third week of the unit. In that way, the first week of school is dedicated to back-to-school activities and learning any new routines in the core program. The second week of school includes important Beginning-of-the-Year placement assessments in Grades 2 and 3. Cursive instruction begins by week three.

The instructional procedure for all grades is as follows:

- Begin cursive writing instruction in week three of Unit 1.
- Do all fourteen lessons in order.
- Do one lesson per day for 15–20 minutes (outside core instruction).\*

\* If you cannot schedule 15–20 minutes per day for a cursive lesson, it is recommended that you spend 5 minutes per day introducing the lesson and then assign the Activity Page as a homework assignment.

## Practice

After the initial fourteen lessons, continue to have students practice cursive writing throughout the year.

- Use the Activity Pages in the Activity Book. These can be done in class or at home.
- Identify writing assignments in the core program that can be completed using cursive writing, such as spelling activities, writing prompts, or responses to text.
- For formal writing assignments using the writing process, require that students publish their work using cursive writing.
- Provide notebooks with lined paper dedicated to cursive writing practice. Students can practice during different times of the day, such as when an assignment is completed early or when there is transitional time between activities or subjects.
- Provide less conventional ways for students to practice. You may use chart paper, whiteboards, or sensory materials like rice, sand, or shaving cream for students to trace the letters on a flat surface.
- At the beginning of each new unit, make plans to reinforce cursive writing practice throughout and determine specific assignments in the unit in which cursive writing will be required and assessed.

## Assessment

Schedule regular check-ins during the year to see how students are progressing.

- **Self-Assessment:** Have students look over their practice letters and sentences and draw a circle around the one they feel is their best example. Have students explain why they think that is their best example (e.g., letter formation, letter spacing, placement on line, letter connection, etc.).
- **Peer Assessment:** Have students exchange papers; ask them to choose the best example of cursive writing (letter or word) and put a star by it. Then have students share with each other why they chose that example.
- **Teacher Assessment:** Identify which cursive writing assignments will be used to assess students' progress. Other writing assignments from the core program may also be used to assess cursive writing. Evaluate the writing and provide timely feedback and support in the following areas:
  - **Letter formation:** letters are formed correctly.
  - **Letter spacing:** letters are correctly and consistently spaced according to the shape of the letters.
  - **Word spacing:** the space between words in a sentence is appropriate.
  - **Line quality:** lines (strokes) should be consistent and smooth.
  - **Slant:** cursive letters should curve slightly to the right.
  - **Letter connections:** letters are joined together properly in words.
