Grade 5, Unit 3 The Reformation: When Books Changed the World

In this unit, students will expand their background knowledge of the time of the Reformation.

What's the story?

Students will gain a better understanding of the **religious and political upheaval** that shifted the power in Europe from the Church to the state.

What will my student learn?

Students will learn about great **scientific advances** that were made during this period. They will read about how the **invention** of an efficient **printing press** helped fuel the **Reformation movement**.

Students will have many opportunities to **write** in this unit. They will **craft a friendly letter** as well as plan and create a **slide presentation** using a similar writing process to an informative essay.

Conversation starters

Ask your student questions about the unit to promote discussion and continued learning:

- 1. Why was the Church such an important part of people's lives in the Middle Ages?
- 2. Why did only privileged families have books in their homes?
 Follow up: How were books made in the Middle Ages? Why were most books printed in Latin?
- 3. Why was the invention of the printing press so important? **Follow up:** What do Gutenberg's printing press and the Internet have in common?
- 4. What is the relationship between religious reform and political reform in Europe during the Reformation?
- 5. You learned about the word *self-disciplined*. What does it mean? **Follow up:** Can you use it in a sentence? I will use it in a sentence too! What is something you wish you were more self-disciplined with? What part of speech is that word?
- 6. What did Galileo's invention of the telescope do? **Follow up:** What did he discover? Who did his findings contradict?
